2. Textiles and Costume Conservation

- A. Survey the Object's Condition
 - Evaluate the condition of the object to determine whether it can be exhibited
 - Estimate the number of hours for mounting, treatment, and budget planning
 - Write condition report with photo documentation

B. Object Treatment

- Write a treatment proposal and get necessary permissions to proceed
- Treatment performance

Cleaning (wet or/and dry)

Steaming

Reinforcement with support fabrics

Reinforcement with stitching

Write treatment report with photo documentation

C. Prepare Object for Exhibition

• Construct the support forms:

3-dimensional form: Custom-made forms for the costumes such as 18th-century men, 18th- and 19th-century women with extreme postures

2-dimensional form: Silhouette form for costumes that have flat construction

Partial form: hats, shoes, and other accessories

- Use of commercial mannequins
- Mounting support forms to fit for each individual object
- Mounting flat textiles
- Installing the object in the exhibition cases

D. Prepare Loan Objects for Packing

- · Cavity packing
- Packing in box
- Consult with packers

E. Rehousing Objects

- Construct soft support forms for the object that can be stored in horizontally in drawers or in boxes
- Construct hard support forms for the object that have extreme construction to require to store vertically
- Make padded hangers
- Make the partial support forms for costume accessories
